TEACHERS OF THE YEAR HONORED

The Shelby County
School System recently honored its most outstanding
teachers of the year at an
awards reception held at
Oak Mountain High School.
The reception was held
Monday, Dec. 3 in recognition of the county's 40
Teacher of the Year recipients. It was sponsored by
the Greater Shelby County
Education Foundation.

From among this year's 40 school Teacher of the Year honorees, three overall winners were selected for the three different grade levels. This year's top winners were Ginger Aaron-Bush, Valley Elementary School; Virginia Lynn McLemore Cook, Montevallo Middle School; and Brian Copes, Calera High School.

The teachers honored from Alabaster schools included Jannel A. Clark, Creek View Elementary; Zipporah Leah Wilson, Meadow View Elementary; Sharon Powell, Thompson Intermediate School; Meagan Duchock, Thompson Sixth-Grade Center; Ruth Byrd Ettinger, Thompson Middle School; and Chris Walker, Thompson High School.

Clark is a third-grade teacher who's been at Creek View for eight years. She's the third-grade PTO representative and a member of the Safety Committee. In her nomination essay, Clark said that she always wanted to be a teacher.

"Ever since I can remember, I always wanted to be a

teacher," Clark wrote. "As a little girl, I would line my dolls up along the wall in my bedroom to play school."

Part of Clark's teaching philosophy is to make the classroom a welcoming place for kids.

"Teachers need to provide a safe, comfortable, and sharing environment. The learning atmosphere should allow students to feel free to take risks and make mistakes," Clark wrote.

Wilson teaches thirdgrade special education at Meadow View. She's currently a School Leadership Team member, School Improvement Team member, and facilitator for the Culture/Hospitality Committee. In her nomination essay, Wilson expressed her enthusiasm for working in special education.

"It is one of the most rewarding and selfless professions. Every day I wake up with new expectations for my kids. I view them as individuals, but I treat them and hold them accountable just as I do their typical peers. Every day is a rewarding challenge," Wilson wrote.

Powell is a fourthgrade teacher at Thompson Intermediate, where she's taught for the past nine years. She chairs the Parenting Day Committee and is a member of the Hospitality



"It's been a fun year so far," said Head Coach Patrick Davis. "We've got a good group of guys that have really bought into what we're doing. We've got some good senior leadership. We start four seniors and have seven seniors on the team that have been in the program and understand what we're trying to do and have really worked at getting better."

In December, the team captured its third-straight Shelby County basketball tournament title with a 51-41 victory over Shelby County. The team also beat Pelham 51-49 in a thrilling OT game on Dec. 7.

According to Davis, the team plays an exciting, pressure-oriented style of defense that doesn't allow opponents to get comfortable. Beyond that, he says that the players have demonstrated great character all throughout the season.

"They're just really unselfish, and they've embraced that from the very beginning of the year," said Davis. "They really share the ball. They don't care who scores. They just care about getting a win, so it's been fun to see them embrace that as the year's gone on."

The Warriors are currently undefeated in Area competition and are hoping to secure the top seed for the Area Tournament. The first round of the Area Tournament is scheduled for Friday, Feb. 8.

"It's a four-team Area. If you win your regular-season Area, not only are you the one-seed for the Area Tournament but you get to host the tournament. Then the top two teams out of the Area Tournament go on to the playoffs," said Davis.

The success of this year's team has inspired great support among the Warrior fans. The students have turned out in droves, creating a fun and energetic home-court atmosphere.

"Our student section is known throughout Birmingham as being one of the best student sections in the state. They take a lot of pride in that," said Davis.

On Dec. 14, the team was able to inspire support beyond the basketball court as well, as it hosted its annual Autism Awareness Night. This year's efforts raised over \$3,800 for Mitchell's Place, which is an autism support organization in Birmingham.

This year's starting five for the Warriors are Rashad Strother (sophomore point guard), Marcus Lewis (senior guard), Caleb Johnson (senior guard), Duke Thomas (senior forward), and DeAndre Gamble (senior forward).

They play at home on Friday, February 1 against Calera. The Boys Varsity is scheduled for 7:30 p.m. For more information, go to THSBasketball.com.



THE NEW YEAR PRESENTS NEW OPPORTUNITES By Senator Cam Ward

Every New Year presents challenges and opportunities. As a people we invariably take stock of the accomplishments and setbacks of the previous year, and take the time to count the many blessings we have, including living in the greatest state in the greatest nation on God's green earth.

As legislators, our minds turn to the yearly drama presented to us by the upcoming Regular Session of the Alabama Legislature. As a legislator, I begin my year thinking of how we can help improve the lives of Alabama's citizens. Can we help people susceptible to fraud and abuse? Can we make our roads and high-

ways safer? Can we make courts more efficient and cost effective? Can we shrink state government and reform or repeal outmoded and outdated business regulations – freeing up capital and putting people to work?


I believe we can. Representative Paul DeMarco, my counterpart in the House Judiciary Committee, and I have already pre-filed a bill to make Élder Abuse a crime in our state. Abuse, neglect and defrauding of our senior citizens is a serious problem, and it deserves its own category in our legal canons to let people know we will not stand for that sort of thing in Alabama. I also plan to introduce a bill to crack down on unlicensed drivers – the amount of damage done by, and the amount of money lost by the state because of this problem approaches the ridiculous.

There are also some very systemic changes we need to make in state government. We also need to work to find common sense, conservative ways to reduce the size of The General Fund Budget. Currently, Medicaid and Corrections make up 65% of our state's non-education spending. At current growth rates and projections these two departments will gobble up our entire budget. That is unsustainable, and I hope we can find the political will to tackle these tough problems.


I plan to continue my work as Chairman of The Senate Energy Committee to find new and creative ways we can encourage innovation in the energy sector in our state. One area of energy efficiency is to reduce the size of our state automobile fleet.

While much of my agenda is pro-active, I want to assure the people that I am also here as a bulwark against bad legislation. I will not allow the dilution of our 2nd Amendment rights through ill-conceived gun control legislation. Public safety is important but piling more laws on top of laws that are already not enforced is not the answer.

The promise of the New Year, and a new legislative session is upon us – I plan to make the most of both in 2013, and I hope you do, too!

"Basically I do senior portraits, family portraits, event photography, weddings, just about anything that you might want docu-mented," said Starling.

credit cards, CDs and checking accounts. Legacy's Premier Checking, for example, is a free checking account that pays monthly dividends and refunds ATM fees automatically up to \$20 a month. They also offer free mobile banking and online bill pay.

"Our Premier Checking is one of the best around," said Arena. "We also have two different credit cards to meet members' needs with no annual fees, low rates and no fee balance transfers."

Legacy Credit Union, which is headquartered in Birmingham, has been serving Birmingham residents since 1955. It originally opened as University Credit Union to serve members of the UAB community and has since grown to include residents in seven counties across the Greater Birmingham Metropolitan area. In 2006, it changed its name to Legacy Community Federal Credit Union.

Membership is open to anyone who lives, works,

worships, or attends school counties: Jefferson, Shelby, Blount, St. Clair, Walker, Chilton, and Bibb. The process to join simply requires opening a \$5 share (savings) account, which can be done online at www.legacycreditunion.com.

"Once you're a member, you're eligible to apply for any of our products and services. Our Switch Kit makes it simple to move to Legacy from your current financial institution. Complete one form and we'll switch all of your automatic drafts for you," said Arena.

At the end of February, Legacy will offer their "Swap & Drop" 1.9 percent APR deal for qualifying





Committee. In her nomination essay, Powell said her views on education were influenced by one of her own teachers, a high school math instructor.

"He was, and still is, my favorite example of a 'teacher.' He made learning enjoyable. He helped us believe that we could learn because he believed it.

Today, with my students, I find myself teaching math incorporating many of his methods and terminologies," Powell wrote. "I try to incorporate an excitement and energy with my teaching, not only in math, but with all of my subjects."

Duchock teaches English at the Sixth-Grade Center, where she's also department head, technology coordinator, and a sponsor for the literary magazine. In her nomination essay, Duchock said that one of the biggest issues in education today is keeping up with technology.

"Technology is the future not only of education, but of everyday life," Duchock wrote. "Not all students have access to computers or other devices at home. Our public schools may be the only place these students have an opportunity to learn how to use applications and Internet. As educators, it is our responsibility to see that these students obtain these skills and become career-ready."

Ettinger is a seventhgrade math and pre-algebra teacher at Thompson Middle School. She's math representative for the School Leadership Team, grade level math department chairperson, and a teacher mentor. Ettinger's teaching involves exploration activities designed to help students better understand the rules they're studying.

coach. Walker was appreciative of his selection for Teacher of the Year.



DAY PROGRAM GETS A NEW HOME IN NEW YMCA BLDG.

Alabaster's YMCA Family Branch is putting the finishing touches on its new building, but it's not just YMCA members that will be enjoying the benefits. Thanks to an agreement with the YMCA, the DAY Program will be using the new building as well.

"We are very excited," said Kathy Miller, the executive director of the DAY Program. "It's going to be great."

The DAY Program (Developing Alabama Youth) is a longstanding youth program in Shelby County that provides educational and clinical services to at-risk students. The program will occupy the second floor of the new YMCA building.

"We'll have six class-

rooms and six counselor offices," said Miller. "In addition to that we'll have a conference room, a testing room, and a large kitchen, which will be more of a break room."

According to Miller, the plan is to be able to hold classes in the new building on Jan. 25.

"The second floor is done. They're now just finishing up the first floor, which is the Y, and the parking lot and the pool, getting a fence around the pool," said Miller.

Miller said they planned to hold a moving day for new furniture and desks on Jan. 19 with assistance from the Rotary Club. After that, they planned to spend the following week moving things from the old classrooms and offices.

For many years, the DAY Program was based in an old brick building near the Siluria mill site. According to Miller, the building was estimated to be around 90 years old in some parts.

"I think it was a doctor's office for many years," she said. "There was an old mill here, and I think it was a doctor's office for those mill employees."

The DAY Program serves Shelby County students who might be at risk for dropping out of school. It consists of grades 7-11. The program has been very successful in helping kids get back on track. In 2012, it celebrated its 30th year anniversary.

"We take kids who are academically behind or who have been involved with the court," said Miller. "They can be referred here, and then we try to catch them up to their grade level and send them back."

The program currently has about 60 students. Moving into the new building will allow the program to grow, possibly to as large as 90 students.

"It will allow us to serve more kids," said Miller.


