ALABASTER SCHOOL BOARD LAUNCHES WEBSITE

At its April 8 meeting, the Alabaster City
Board of Education
announced the launch of its new website
www.alabasterschools.org.
Interim Superintendent Dr.
Phil Hammonds said the new site would launch on
Tuesday, April 9 at 9 a.m.

"I think you'll be pleased with it," said Hammonds. "It looks very professional."

According to Hammonds, the new site will feature job postings, plus links to the various Alabaster schools.

"There's a lot of information already on there. There will be more and more information each week as the district moves forward," he said.

Hammonds also announced the board's new twitter handle

(@AlabasterK12), which can be found at Twitter.com.

During the meeting, the board also approved two new job descriptions, which Hammonds said would be posted the next day. One was for a coordinator of federal programs, a position that Hammonds called "critical," and the other a revised description for an administrator of technology and information systems.

According to Hammonds, the IT position will include working with school principals to help implement new technologies, like smart boards.

The board also passed a resolution authorizing the admission of nonresident children of district employees to Alabaster schools.

"This will be a very positive step for our employees, so they can know there's a

process in place where their children can attend school in Alabaster," said Hammonds.

During the meeting, the board heard from DAY Program Executive Director Kathy Miller. The DAY Program is an educational and clinical program for atrisk youth in Shelby County. It's been in existence for over 30 years, providing vital services to students aged 13 to 18.

Also giving a presentation were Lacey Aman and Ashley Huck, who discussed plans for a possible afterschool program for the new school district.

Board Attorney Carl Johnson gave an update on the search for a school superintendent, saying they'd received 16 applications from a diverse group of applicants. He recommended that the board start to narrow the field to a reasonable number of finalists.

During the meeting's "Good Things Within Our Schools" segment, THS Band Director Jon Bubbett talked about the high school's jazz band as well as the need for new marching band uniforms. He said the program's raised over \$37,000 for new uniforms but is still considerably short of its goal.

Two band members were on hand to illustrate the need for new uniforms. One wore an original, 18-year-old uniform, while the other wore a modern, stylish, lightweight uniform.

The board also welcomed its new secretary, Maxine Burns, whose first day of work was that day.

Country star Josh Turner has been announced as the headline musical act for this year's Alabaster CityFest. The singer will take the main stage at 9 p.m. on Saturday, June 1 at Municipal Park.

Turner, a distinctive singer with a deep and recognizable singing voice, has been piling up the hits since he first burst onto the scene with his debut country album "Long Black Train."

That album was released in 2003 and earned Turner one of his most popular hits with the album's inspirational title track, "Long Black Train." The song reached No. 13 on Billboard's Hot Country Songs chart and set the wheels of Turner's music career in motion.

His subsequent album "Your Man" yielded two No. 1 singles in the title track ("Your Man") and "Would You Go With Me." More hits followed for Turner on his next two releases "Everything is Fine" (2007) and "Haywire" (2010). With the release of his latest studio album, "Punching Bag," the train doesn't appear to be slowing down any time soon. "Punching Bag," which was

released last June, debuted at No. 1 on Billboard's Country Albums chart. It's also produced the hit single "Time Is Love," which topped Billboard's

year-end country chart at the end of 2012.

The album includes a variety of traditional country sounds, ranging from up-tempo tunes to mellow introspection. According to Turner's website (joshturner.com), the ideas for the album started flowing when he was experiencing a particularly tough time in his life.

"I've learned that songs come to you in various ways, from all different angles," he's quoted as saying. "Nothing was going my way that day, and I felt like I was up against the world. When I got home, my wife Jennifer and I were talking about things that happened and I said, 'You know, I just feel like a punching bag, like life is beating me up."

Of the album's 11 tracks, Turner wrote eight of them. The hit "Time Is Love," however, was penned by Mark Nesler, Tony Martin and Tom Shapiro, veteran songwriters with multiple country hits to their credit.

A native of South Carolina, Turner attended Belmont University in Nashville and lives in Tennessee with his wife and three children. His newest single "Find Me A Baby" is available on iTunes.





LOCAL BAND ATTICUS AVENUE MOVING ON UP

For local rock band Atticus Avenue, playing the Main Stage at CityFest is an exciting milestone on the band's climb to success. The past two years, the band has played the Day Stage at the festival, and they're hoping this year's increased exposure will be a sign of things to come.

"Being on the Main Stage is extremely exciting," said drummer Brad Kuehner. "For us to be able to play in our hometown in front of the people we're going to run into all the time and give them an opportunity to see what we do, it's a really good thing for us."

The band consists of Alabaster residents Brad Kuehner (drums/vocals) and Billy Rigdon (bass/vocals), plus Stephen Wade (lead guitar/vocals) and Drew Kuehner (lead singer/guitar). Brad and Drew are brothers, though the band just officially got started in 2010.

"Really we formed Atticus Avenue in 2010," said Brad. "From '07 to 2010, we called ourselves Chasing Saturday and just played all cover songs. As we started getting the key players in position, we started realizing we're in place now to actually do the stuff we love, which is writing our own stuff."

The band's current configuration came together about six months ago, with the addition of Wade on lead guitar. Brad said they had a number of different guitar players prior to that, but they knew they had their man when they first heard Stephen play.

"The kid walks in and he just blew us away," said Brad. "At the end of the first session, we were all like, if he's as committed as we are, this is our guy."

The rock-and-roll outfit has been a regular performer on the bar scene the past couple of years, but the band's aspirations aim higher than that.

"We spent about a full year last year doing a lot of the bar shows and cover shows and just playing the classic rock that we all love," said Brad.

Along the way, they've also been honing their originals, and they're hoping to get in the studio sometime in August.


"We're up to about twelve original songs we've written," he said. "We're looking to go to the studio and all that fun stuff real soon."

Brad said they call their sound fundamental Southern rock. It combines contemporary influences with rock classics, like the Rolling Stones.

Thompson High School Girls Soccer players Tatum Harless and Michaela Graber recently signed to play college soccer at the University of Montevallo. The two seniors celebrated the occasion on Feb. 18 with a signing ceremony in the Thompson

"It's a great honor for Thompson High School to have so many successful athletes," Head Coach Nathan Button said during the ceremony. "I would like to congratulate both of you on your success because it's not easy to get success. You have to earn it, and both of you have done that."

Both girls are key contributors on this year's successful Warrior team, which is currently ranked No. 7 in Class 6A with a record of 13-5-1.

Harless, a midfielder for

the Warriors, said she was especially thankful for the opportunity to play college soccer, after having to overcome two serious knee injuries. She tore an ACL in 2009 and then tore the ACL in her other leg in 2012.

"I tore my second ACL my junior year so it was harder for college coaches to recruit me when I couldn't play. That was the most important time," said Harless. "When I finally made a choice, it took a lot of stress off of me."

In 2011, Harless set the single-season Thompson record for assists with 16. Harless also played for Birmingham United Soccer (BUSA 95 Elite), which won the 2012 Alabama D1 Powerade State Cup Championship.

Graber, a forward for the Warriors, said she was happy with her decision to commit to the Falcons.







COMMUNITY GARDEN TAKING ROOT

For anyone who's wanted to plant a garden but didn't have the room, the new Alabaster Community Garden has a great solution. For \$100 a year, residents can lease a 20-by-20 plot of land, where they can plant whatever vegetables they choose.

'Anybody that wants to get involved can lease one of those plots and plant what they want to," said local resident Robert Webb, who's spearheading the


project.

The new community garden is located at the City of Alabaster's Limestone Park off Highway 31 south of Saginaw Pipe. The garden area itself is located to the left of the pond at Limestone Park and is divided into two distinct sections. Part of the land is dedicated to Manna Charities, an Alabasterbased food bank that assists local families in need. The other area is divided into individual plots, which residents can lease and use for themselves.

"There's a 75-by-100 spot that's laid out for Manna, said Webb. "Everything that's zoned in that 75 foot by 100 goes directly back to Manna. Right beside it there's a 120-by-220 spot that's laid out in 20-foot plots. We lease those to individuals, and you plant what you want to."

Webb said he originally started the project last summer, though it just recently came together with the commitment of the land from the City of Alabaster.

"It's something that I've wanted to do for years and years, but I've never had the time to do it," he said. "It actually started last July. I got involved with a guy that used to have a community garden in Birmingham. I got family will eat," he said.

In a study called 2013

Building Business in Alabama: How Business Friendly Are Alabama's 50 Largest Cities, the Alabama Policy Institute (API) evaluated Alabama's Most Business Friendly cities. The API has collected data on Alabama 's 50 most populous cities and ranked them based on criteria that both ensure business success and protect the entrepreneurial spiri t . The four categories in which data are ranked are Economic Vitality, Business Tax Burden, Community Allure, and Transportation Infrastructure.

The City of Alabaster shined and came in overall as the 26th most business

friendly city in Alabama. Not surprisingly, Alabaster came in third in the state in the category of Community Allure Ranking. The factors that make up the Community Allure category count for a smaller percentage of the rankings than Business Tax Burden and Economic Vitality. Nevertheless, indicators such as the cost of living index, education performance, and crime rates all play a key role in any city's business climate. With its reasonable cost of living, safe neighborhoods, and good education system, Alabaster proudly claimed the third top spot in the state for this category.


When I ran for the

Legislature in 2010 on a pro-business and job creation platform, I promised to support our businesses and I have worked hard to follow through. I believe if you focus on shrinking the size of government, keeping taxes low, and eliminating burdensome regulations that businesses will succeed and create new jobs.

In an earlier column, I shared information about the Red Tape Reduction Act I'm sponsoring this year. At the time of writing, this bill has passed the Senate and is currently waiting to be signed by Governor Bentley. This measure was designed to unburden businesses of all

in the mood to get outdoors for some family fun and experience Alabama's natural heritage first hand. The Cahaba Lily, which is a type of spiderlily, is an aquatic plant that is found in special habitats of major river systems of Alabama, Georgia, and South Carolina. The lily lives in portions of the rivers that are immediately above and below the fall line. These are areas of fast-flowing water due to the change in elevation of the terrain and

numerous rock layers and boulders that resist the flow. The lilies sprout from bulbs that take root between the rocks which also trap and hold the seeds that are produced each spring. Cahaba lilies begin to flower in the middle of May, reaching their peak in late May and early June. The lilies cover sections of the Cahaba River in a sea of snow white flowers and are a site to behold. The brilliance and sheer number of flowers give the illusion of drifts of snow in bands winding through the

The highlight of the presentations is a talk on the Cahaba Lily by Dr. Larry Davenport of Samford University.


