## SIDEWALK ORDINANCE **PASSES**

The Alabaster City Council voted to pass a new sidewalk ordinance at its regularly-scheduled meeting on Monday, July 1. The new ordinance establishes a process to address sidewalk repair and maintenance within the city.

The intent of the ordinance, as presented in the meeting, is to ensure the safe passage of Alabaster citizens upon Alabaster

sidewalks.

Under the ordinance, damaged sidewalks will be noted, and the Public Works department will issue a notice to repair to the appropriate homeowner. Unless an emergency situation indicates otherwise, the notice will direct the owner to repair the damage within 30 days of

the mailing.

If the owner fails to make the appropriate repairs within the indicated period of time, the Public Works department will be authorized to make those repairs. Following the department's repair work, the City Council will hold a public hearing on the matter, after which it may assess the cost of the repairs against the proper-

Prior to approving the ordinance, the Council held a public hearing in which a number of local residents voiced concerns over the issue. One resident raised the question of longstanding, or preexisting, sidewalk damage. Another voiced concern over damage caused by neighbors.

In response to those concerns, Councilman Russell Bedsole said homeowners would be able to present specific issues during the public hearing part of the

The design of that public hearing is so that if you as a homeowner have any reason you believe that you shouldn't be held accountable, if you had somebody parking on your sidewalk, if there was a tree that was planted too close to your sidewalk prior to you owning the property, things of that nature, this would be the chance for you to come to the Council and petition us and say that that should not be your responsibility to pay for," said Bedsole.

According to Bedsole, state law has always held that the homeowner is responsible for sidewalk repair. The new ordinance simply provides a mechanism for the City of Alabaster to initiate those

repairs.

'Now we have the ability to get involved and have a process in which these repairs will begin to happen," Bedsole said. Councilwoman Sophie

Martin pointed out that the ordinance protects taxpayers from paying for side-walks that might be damaged due to ongoing mistreatment by the home-

"There are places in the city where the problem is continuous and taxpayer money is being spent to repair the same repair over and over again, where the homeowner knows what is causing the damage," Martin said.

One thing that will stay the same, however, is that parents will want to make sure their children are properly registered for the appropriate Alabaster school. This year, the school year is scheduled to begin on Monday, Aug. 19, so the first day is just around the corner.

Parents with questions can contact the specific school directly or visit the Alabaster City Schools website (Alabasterschools.org), where the new school sites are linked. They can also call the school system at 624-3105. For up-to-theminute updates, the school system is also on Facebook and Twitter (@alabasterk12).

#### Creek View Elementary

Summer registration for new students is Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday, from 8 to 11 a.m. Registration for students that have pre-registered is July 31, from 7 to 11 a.m. and 3 to 7 p.m.

Parent Night for kindergarten parents will be Thursday, Aug. 15; first grade parents on Monday, Aug. 26; second grade

parents on Tuesday, Aug. 27; and third grade parents on Thursday, Aug. 29.

Meet the Teacher day, in which the kids will have the opportunity to meet their teachers, will be Friday, Aug. 16, 8:30 to 11:30 a.m.

#### Meadow View Elementary

Summer registration at Meadow View is Monday through Friday, 8 to 11 a.m. and 1 to 3 p.m. It runs until Friday, August 16. Two proofs of residence are required.

Parent Night for kindergarten parents is on Tuesday, Aug. 13; first grade parents on Thursday, Aug. 29; second grade parents on Thursday, Aug. 22; and third grade on Tuesday, Aug. 27.

Homerooms will be posted on Friday, Aug. 9. Orientation is scheduled for Thursday, Aug. 15, starting with first grade at 8 a.m., kindergarten at 9 a.m., third grade at 10 a.m. and second grade at 11 a.m.

#### Thompson Intermediate

New student registration is available Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Thursdays at Thompson Intermediate School, from 8 a.m. to 2 p.m. The date for Meet the Teacher is Aug. 15, 12:30 to 1:30 p.m. (fourth grade) and 2 to 3 p.m. (fifth grade). Students can bring their school supplies on that day. Registration for students that are pre-registered is July 25.

Summer registration is available at the Sixth Grade Center on Tuesday and Thursday, from 7:30 a.m. to 1 p.m. It will run from July 2 to July 30. Schedule pickup day is Thursday, Aug. 1, from 8 a.m. to 12 noon.

Final registration and schedule pickup is Monday, Aug. 5 for seventh graders (3 to 7 p.m.) and Tuesday, Aug. 6 for eighth graders (3 to 7 p.m.) in the Thompson Middle School gym. Parents should bring a photo ID and two proofs of residence. For a list of school supplies, visit the school website.

#### CITY HONORS FIRST RESPONDERS

At the July 1 City Council meeting, Alabaster Mayor Marty Handlon issued a proclamation honoring the professional response of the City's emergency responders to a recent home invasion.

On May 6, Alabaster resident Joy Sullivan was the victim of a home invasion and assault, and she wanted to show her gratitude to those who helped her survive the attack and its aftermath. Handlon assisted Sullivan with the public thank-you by reading a proclamation before the City Council.

"Courage, compassion, selfless concern for others and the duty to protect and serve are commonlyheld values among these first responders. They provide a vital public service 24 hours a day, seven days a week, and 52 weeks a

year," read Handlon. "These professionals undergo significant education, training and personal sacrifice in order to achieve the expertise required to respond to any type of emergency situation.

Before reading the proclamation, Handlon said it was Sullivan's way of thanking Alabaster's police officers and firefighters, along with the Shelby County Sheriff's Office and Regional Paramedical Services. The various firstresponders in attendance that assisted Sullivan were also asked to stand at the front as Handlon called their names.

"The help has been outstanding, and I appreciate that," said Sullivan. "I couldn't have survived it without these guys right here. I want to say thank you from the bottom of my

In other news, the City Council approved a resolution extending the deadline to close the development deal to bring a Dick's Sporting Goods store to Alabaster.

According to Councilman Rick Walters, the developer (Highway 11/31 LLC) requested extra time to close the deal, which had originally run through July 1.

"Resolution 070113 extends the economic incentive grant agreement until Sept 1, 2013," said Walters. "The remainder of the economic development grant shall remain unchanged."


In the public comment portion of the meeting, residents from Alabaster's Ironwood subdivision complained about a rash of petty thefts that have taken place recently in the neighborhood.



#### SCHOOL BOARD HOLDS 1ST MEETING AS NEW DISTRIC

On Monday, July 8, the Alabaster Board of Education held its first meeting since separating from the Shelby County School System. The regularly-scheduled monthly meeting was also the first with Dr. Wayne Vickers as the new superintendent.

"We're very glad to have you on board," School Board President Adam Moseley told Vickers during the meeting.

The new city school district has been years in the making. A study was commissioned by the Alabaster City Council in 2011 to gauge the financial feasibility of a city school district.

Vickers, who was hired from the Saraland City School System, officially started the job on July 1. He said he was excited to be joining the community.

"I'm a proud resident of

the City of Alabaster. My son went to his first football practice today," said Vickers. "This is an exciting time for Alabaster."

During the meeting, the board addressed a number of new business items, including the approval of some facility-improvement projects recommended by Volkert, Inc. Vickers said the projects fell into two categories, with one being paint and construction and the other being HVAC.

"The HVAC is something I feel like we need to get ahead of in July so we're not faced with ordering those parts in August," Vickers told the board.

The board also approved a new phone system for the schools, a contract for occupational therapy services and an agreement with the DAY Program. It also approved the hiring of

onsite technical support.

"This is an agreement for temporary network services support. It will be billed to us on an hourly basis," said Vickers. "We have to make sure that when our teachers come in to do lesson plans and work this summer that they are prepared, that they have everything in place."

During the discussion part of the meeting, Vickers introduced the school system's new coordinator of technology, Keith Price. Price has an impressive resume, including five years as the chief technology officer for the Hoover City Schools and eight years with the Alabama School of Fine Arts. He also previously worked for Dell.

"Everyone on my staff I feel is a superstar, and with Mr. Price agreeing to come and be our coordinator of technology, I think we definitely have another superstar to add to that list,' said Vickers. "He comes to us highly recommended, and he has already hit the ground running.'

Student Services Coordinator Dorann Tanner also discussed the development of the school system's code of conduct before the board.

#### K TO SCHOOL" SAL

The State of Alabama's "Back to School" sales tax holiday is scheduled for Friday, Aug. 2 through Sunday, Aug. 4. The annual, threeday sales tax holiday is set to begin at 12:01 a.m. on Friday and end at 12 midnight on Sunday.

The State of Alabama's sales tax holiday was first created in 2006 to give back-to-school shoppers a break on necessary school supplies. It's become a popular shopping weekend in the state as savvy shoppers use the holiday to purchase a variety of covered items.

According to the original act (Sales Tax Holiday Act No. 2006-574), the State of Alabama waives state sales or use tax on certain

school-related items during the first full weekend of August. It also gives counties and municipalities an opportunity to participate in the holiday by waiving local sales or use tax as well.

Last year, the Alabaster City Council passed an ordinance (Ordinance No. 12-005) exempting the covered items from municipal sales and use tax "during the first full weekend of August 2012 and each consecutive year thereafter." The City of Alabaster's participation in the annual holiday means local shoppers can reap the greatest possible savings when purchasing covered items.

According to the Department of Revenue, covered items include clothing (\$100 or less, per article

of clothing); computers, software and school computer supplies (a single purchase with a sales price of \$750 or less); school supplies, school art supplies and school instructional materials (sales price of \$50 or less, per item); and books (with a sales price of \$30 or less, per book).

Some examples of exempted clothing items include belts, boots, caps, coats, jackets, jeans, raincoats, school uniforms and sneakers. Taxable items would include accessories like briefcases, handbags, jewelry, umbrellas and watches.

This is the eighth year for Alabama to hold a sales tax holiday for back-to-school shoppers.

cake, red velvet, cookies and cream, sweet potato, chocolate fudge and many more. And to keep things interesting, they change the flavors from day to day.



#### CAROLINE'S CART GOES NATIONAL

After years in development, Caroline's Cart is finally getting the national distribution its designer, Drew Ann Long of Alabaster, had hoped for.

"The world's largest shopping cart manufacturer picked up our product," said Long. "We are beside ourselves."

Long, whose daughter Caroline has Rett Syndrome, first started working on her design for a special-needs shopping cart in 2008. She was inspired to create the product when she realized that Caroline had outgrown the smaller seats of traditional shopping carts.

Caroline's Cart features a large, comfortable seat

and a platform underneath for the feet. It also includes two maneuverable handles that can be turned to provide convenient access to the seat.

On July 18, Technibilt, the company that will be manufacturing and selling the carts, marked the national launch of Caroline's Cart with an event at their headquarters in North Carolina.

Long had actually approached Technibilt several years earlier with her idea, but she was turned down due a lack of established demand. Following the meeting, however, she was inspired to go out and demonstrate the need for the product.

"They encouraged me,"

said Long, "so I continued to build the demand, 100 percent grassroots. We got a small manufacturer to sell some carts, get us in 18 states, and all this time, they were following me via Facebook."

When Technibilt realized that the demand for the product was out there, they contacted Long to see if she was still interested in a partnership.

"I got a phone call from

#### REDUCING RED TAPE by Representative April Weaver

Over the past several years, I have worked with many local business owners who were concerned that satisfying bureaucratic red tape requirements eats up man hours, produces numerous compliance costs and takes their attention away from their main objective - keeping the doors open and providing jobs. During the 2013 legislative session, I sponsored the Red Tape Reduction Act for a second year and we continued the fight for Alabama businesses. On July 1, Alabama businesses scored big as the Red Tape Reduction Act officially became law. After many years of work from

Alabama business owners and pro business organizations, the vision finally became reality.

The Red Tape Reduction Act requires any state agency proposing a rule that might have an adverse effect on business to file an impact statement with the Joint Legislative Committee on Administrative Regulation Review prior to its adoption if the agency receives a complaint that the regulation might negatively impact a business. The committee can direct the agency to modify or drop the proposed rule.

The law also requires all existing regulations to

be reviewed every five years to determine whether they should be amended, rescinded or remain unchanged. Information related to proposed and existing regulation reviews will also be placed on agency websites to provide public access.

Alabaster's growth is at an all time high. Shelby County continues to lead the state with the lowest unemployment rate of 4.3%. Alabaster is one of the fastest growing cities in one of the fastest growing counties in the country. State government should concentrate on giving business owners the tools they need to remain successful instead of finding ways to suffocate them under the weight of needless government oversight and mounds of paperwork.

The Red Tape



Reduction Act is a major milestone in making it easier to do business in Alabama by relieving businesses from inefficient government regulations.

The bottom line is the new law protects businesses from having to spend time and money fighting state regulations that would reduce productivity.

After growing up in a household that was supported by a small business, I am happy to see this legislation become law. Businesses in Alabama should spend time growing their business, not dealing with bureaucratic red tape.

#### AREA ROAD IMPROVEMENTS SCHEDULED

Over the past few weeks, the Alabama Department of Transportation has been repaving portions of Alabama 119 from the U.S. 31 intersection in Alabaster to the city limits of Montevallo. The project is expected to be fully completed around the end of August.

"We're doing this all the way to Montevallo," said Gary Ray, a district engineer with the Alabama Department of Transportation. "We got the multilane in Alabaster in first because we wanted to fix those rail crossings out near 31."

The roadwork has been performed primarily at night to provide for the least possible impact on local traffic, with lane closures running from 7 p.m. to 6 a.m.

"This is a nighttime job because of congestion," said Ray. "We're blocking the lanes at night instead of in the day."

Currently crews are working on the section of road heading south out of Alabaster. There remains some finishing work to be done on the northern section, including centerline and lane striping.

"The multilane of 119 in Alabaster is pretty well complete except for the final application of striping," said Ray.

According to Ray, the timely repaving of roads can prevent the need for major repair work later on. It also protects vehicles from possible hazards that might develop, like potholes.

"You don't want to wait until your road starts failing in underling layers before you do something," he said. Another project that residents can be on the lookout for is a repaying project of U.S. 31, south of Interstate 65.

"That one will start about the first week in August. It is also a nighttime job," said Ray.

The project will be similar to the repaving project on 119, though it's a different contractor performing the work. The starting point will be the Interstate bridge in Alabaster, and the end point will be the Interstate bridge in Calera.


The project includes the multilane portion of the highway by the Colonial Promenade shopping center. Ray said some of the pavement there has started to show signs of stress and that the new surface will look much better.

Thompson Road should

be seeing some improvements in its future as well. Based on a February announcement by Alabama Governor Robert Bentley, Thompson Road (County Road 264) will be receiving a new bridge, new turn lanes and resurfacing from 1,300 feet west of Warrior Drive to Alabama 119.

The project is part of the Alabama Transportation Rehabilitation and Improvement Program (ATRIP), which the governor officially unveiled in March 2012. According to Alabaster officials, City contract engineers are currently working with Shelby County on the design for the project.

#### THE SUMMER TANAGER by David Frings



A flash of bright red at the backyard feeder immediate-

ly brings to mind the Eastern Cardinal, but a closer look may reveal another visitor. While the cardinal is the most common red-colored visitor to the backyards of Alabaster, the Summer Tanager is another that often goes unnoticed.

Males of both species differ by the Summer Tanager being the only solid red bird in Alabama and Eastern Cardinals having a prominent crest in both sexes. Both species are sexually dimorphic which means they show outward color differences between males and females. The female tanager is a yellowish-green which make her difficult

for predators to spot while she is tending the nest.

While the Summer Tanager is not the most common backyard bird, it will frequent backyards that supply a suitable habitat. Since it is known to breed in forest formed by pines and oaks with gaps and openings, a yard with natural landscaping is often called home for the summer. Offering peanut butter, suet, and some fruit at the feeders during spring arrival is one way to increase your chances of being the summer home for these beauties.

The Summer Tanager is considered somewhat of a bee and wasp specialist at the dinner table. These unwanted insects along with an array of others are eagerly taken during the breeding season to quench the appetites of the hungry family. If you want to attract insect eating birds to your

backyard garden, avoid using pesticides that may eliminate the food source and could even endanger growing chicks.

Summer Tanagers will construct an open-topped nest among clusters of leaves or in a fork of a tree adjacent to open areas. Typical clutches are comprised of two to five paleblue to pale-green eggs. Pairs are monogamous and can produce up to two clutches annually. The eggs hatch in approximately 12 days and chicks mature quickly, leaving the nest about two weeks later.

While Alabama and other parts of the U. S. are home for the tanager family during the summer, Central and South America are called home during the winter. The birds eat large numbers of insects between the end of the summer nesting season and the migra-



SUMMER TANAGER tion south in the fall in order to store enough fat to make the long journey. Coastal regions of Alabama such as Dauphin Island are favorite spots for birders for both the spring and fall migrations.
