"BACK TO SCHOOL" SALES TAX HOLIDAY AUG.1-3

The state's annual back-to-school sales tax holiday will be held the first weekend in August, starting Friday, Aug. 1, at 12:01 a.m. and ending on Sunday, Aug. 3, at 12 midnight.

This will be the state's ninth annual back-to-school sales tax holiday. The three-day shopping holiday was created in 2006 to give parents and other shoppers an opportunity to buy certain school-related items without the burden of state sales or use tax.

According to the original act (Sales Tax Holiday Act No. 2006-574), the state waives state sales or use tax on certain school-related items annually during the first full weekend of August. It also gives counties and municipalities an opportunity to participate in the holiday by waiving local sales or use tax as well.

Items covered by the act include clothing (\$100 or less, per article of clothing); computers, software and school computer supplies (a single purchase with a sales price of \$750 or less); school supplies, school art supplies and school instructional materials (sales price of \$50 or less, per item); and books (with a sales price of \$30 or less, per book).

Municipal sales tax will also be waived for those same items, based on an ordinance passed by the Alabaster City Council two years ago. The ordinance (Ordinance No. 12-005) exempted the covered items "during the first full weekend of August 2012 and each consecutive year thereafter."

Clothing items not covered include things that are sold separately, like belt buckles, costume masks or patches and emblems. It also doesn't include sports

or recreational equipment, like baseball gloves or shin guards.

In 2012, the State of Alabama created a second sales tax holiday, to assist shoppers with severe weather preparedness. That holiday takes place the last full weekend in February each year and exempts items related to emergency preparedness.

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BACK TO SCHOOL REGISTRATION INFORMATION

The dog days of summer are here, which means it's time for school kids to start thinking about heading back to class. This year, Alabaster City Schools will begin the fall semester on Thursday, Aug. 7, so parents should make sure their kids are properly registered and ready to start the new year.

This year, registration has been slightly different than in the past, as parents have been using an online registration system to register their children via the Internet. After completing online registration, however, parents are still required to go by the appropriate school and present two proofs of residence.

Primary proofs can include utility bills or deposit receipts (electric bill, water bill, etc.) or an apartment or home lease/mortgage (lease agreement or monthly mortgage statement).

Secondary proofs may include a variety of other documents like property tax records, income tax records, Social Security checks, employment records, bank statements

and other bills.

Students that are new to the system are also required to present a certified birth certificate and an up-to-date immunization certificate. For questions, contact Central Office at 663-8400.

Creek View Elementary

Creek View will hold Warrior Day on Wednesday, July 30. Parents will need to bring a driver's license, along with two proofs of residence. Also, if they have a verification sheet, after completing the online registration, they should bring that as well. "Meet the Teacher" is scheduled for Wednesday, Aug. 6, 8:30 to 11 a.m.

Meadow View Elementary

Meadow View is accepting proofs of residence, from 8 to 11 a.m. or 1 to 3 p.m., Monday through Friday, until Wednesday, Aug. 6. There will also be two evening periods, from 3 to 7 p.m., on Tuesday, July 22 and Thursday, July 24. "Parent Night" sessions

are scheduled for Tuesday, Aug. 5 (kindergarten), Thursday, Aug. 14 (second grade), Tuesday, Aug. 19 (third grade) and Thursday, Aug. 21 (first grade).

Thompson Intermediate School

For those without a computer, TIS will have an area in the office to complete the online registration. Office hours are 7 a.m. to 3 p.m. Monday through Thursday and 7 to 11 a.m. on Friday. Parents can also provide their proofs of residence at those times. TIS will also be open till 7 p.m. on Tuesday, July 29. Orientation will be Monday, Aug. 4, from 8 to 9 a.m. (fourth grade) and 9:30 to 10:30 a.m. (fifth grade).

Thompson Sixth Grade Center

Warrior Day for the Sixth Grade Center will be Thursday, July 31. That will include schedule pickup and a tour of the building. Hours for the day will be based on the student's team: Braves, 8 to 9 a.m.,

Dreamcatchers, 9:30 to 10:30 a.m., and Wigwams, 11 a.m. to 12 noon. Days for parents to provide residence documents are July 15, 17, 22 and 24, from 9 to 11 a.m. and 1 to 3 p.m.

Thompson Middle Schoot

Thompson Middle School will hold Tribe Day on Wednesday, Aug. 6, from 9:30 to 11:30 a.m. in the TMS gymnasium. That's the orientation event for seventh graders and new students. It will also feature a tour of the school. Parents can bring their proofs of residence on Monday, July 28, from 9 a.m. to 12 noon and 3 to 6 p.m.

Prior to schedule pickup, parents should complete the online registration and provide two proofs of residence.

NEW HIGH SCHOOL ON THE HORIZON

Alabaster City Schools recently celebrated its oneyear anniversary as a new school system, and though it's already accomplished quite a lot, its biggest achievement may still be on the horizon.

At a specially-called meeting on May 19, the Alabaster City Board of Education unanimously voted to authorize Superintendent Dr. Wayne Vickers to enter into an agreement to purchase real estate in Alabaster that would serve as the location for a new high school.


The undeveloped prop-

erty consists of approximately 300 acres and is located to the west of the current Thompson High School location. It sits roughly between the Sterling Gate subdivision off Thompson Road and the Lake Forest subdivision off Kent Dairy Road.

The size of the land is large enough to accommodate both a new high school as well as new athletic facilities, which the School Board intends to fund using a planned \$120 million bond. The new facilities are part of the Board's five-year

capital plan, which it approved in September of last year.

At a June 23 meeting, the Alabaster City Council lent a supportive hand to the effort when it voted to extend its 1-percent, schoolrelated sales tax for the next 30 years, the expected duration of the school board's bond. The sales tax was origi-

ANSWERING MEDICARE OUESTIONS BY REP. APRIL WEAVER

In my role as a legislator, I often encounter senior citizens who have questions about Medicare. I am in no way an expert in this area, but I have found a resource that can help you find the answers. The State Health Insurance Assistance Program (SHIP) is a free counseling service provided by the Middle

Alabama Area Agency on Aging (M4A). They can help you educate yourself to navigate the challenges of Medicare.

SHIP helps answer questions about Medicare, Medicare Supplemental Insurance, Medicare Advantage Plans, Medicare Part D (prescription drug coverage), long-term care insurance, and programs to assist with Part B and Part D premiums (the Medicare Savings Program and the Limited-Income Subsidy). SHIP provides free, impartial information to help consumers make decisions regarding their health care choices. When a Medicare beneficiary has a question about Medicare benefits, the beneficiary may contact the local SHIP

at 205-670-5770 or 1-866-570-2998.


During Open Enrollment (which starts October 15), SHIP has about two dozen community events in which SHIP counselors meet face-to-face with beneficiaries to provide help with plan enrollment and changes. Usually, the SenioRx program (a program funded by the Alabama State Legislature) partners with SHIP for these events since many seniors, people with disabilities and Medicaid beneficiaries need medication assistance.

M4A is particularly interested in outreach and education to seniors on the preventive services offered by Medicare because these services complement their

wellness program. M4A currently administers four different evidence-based wellness programs which are preventive and educational, such as the Chronic Disease Self-Management Program, the Arthritis Foundation Exercise Program, the Arthritis Foundation Walk with Ease Program, and Tai Chi designed to prevent falls.

If you are a senior citizen and you have questions about Medicare, I encourage you to call the SHIP program at M4A. A SHIP counselor will help you be a wise consumer so that you get the most out of your healthcare dollars.









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LOCAL GIRL WINS STATE PAGEANT

Alabaster resident Savannah Buttram, 17, was recently crowned Miss Alabama Teen at the state's National American Miss pageant in Montgomery.

As winner of the state title, Buttram will get to compete in the national NAM pageant, which will be held Nov. 25-30 in Anaheim, Calif.

"They have all the state pageants throughout the year and then you compete in November for the national title," said Joy Letson, Buttram's mother. "They go to Hollywood, Calif., the week of Thanksgiving."

The Alabama pageant was divided into five different age groups, with titles being awarded for Miss Alabama Princess (ages 4-6), Miss Alabama Junior Pre-Teen (ages 7-9), Miss Alabama Pre-Teen (ages 10-12), Miss Alabama Junior Teen (ages 13-15) and Miss Alabama Teen (ages 16-18).

Buttram, who graduated this year from Thompson High School, has participated in the annual pageant for ten years. She previously won state titles as a Junior Pre-Teen and Pre-Teen.

"She's done it for ten years, so it's been a great thing to grow into," said Letson. "This will be her third trip to California."

Buttram said she was excited by the win and the opportunity to return to California.

"It was amazing, because I've been in the pageant for so long. So it's cool to have this experience to be able to go to nationals again," said Buttram.

National American Miss is a nationwide pageant program that promotes self-confidence among its participants. In addition to the various awards that participants can receive, they also gain valuable speaking experience in front of an audience.

"It is a really good organization," said Letson. "They base everything on your interview skills, speaking, formal wear and community service. They strive to build personal skills up."

According to Letson, the pageant will pay for Buttram's airfare to California and the pageant fees to compete at the national competition. She'll still need to raise money for the event, which she plans to do by selling chances to win a pair of original drawings she'll be doing this summer.

Buttram said if she

were to win nationals, she would be the first girl from Alabama to win. Either way, she is looking forward to the chance to participate and enjoy the event.





ALDI FOOD MARKET CHOOSES ALABASTER LOCATION

Construction crews have begun site work for a new Aldi at the intersection of U.S. Highway 31 and County Road 11. This store will be the second store for the chain in Shelby County and make a total of eight in the Birmingham metropolitan area. Construction of the Alabaster Aldi should be completed in the latter portion of 2014, just in time for that holiday shopping. Access to the retailer will be allowed from U.S. Highway 31 and County Road 11. Cam Ward, Executive Director of the Alabaster Industrial Development Board, says that the Alabaster store should be around 24,000 square feet.

Representatives from Aldi are working with the

Shelby County Commission to improve the intersection of the county road with Highway 31 during the construction project.

Aldi Food Markets are an international corporation with stores in seventeen countries. Their mission is "simply smarter shopping" which gives them a different look from more traditional U.S. grocery retailers. Aldi only carries a limited number of name brand products that may be recognizable to Alabaster shoppers. Instead, they rely heavily on their own store brands in order to pass significant savings to the customer. Other cost saving measures used by Aldi include renting shopping carts for a

quarter and requiring shopper to bring their own shopping bags.

Customers bringing their own bags not only saves cost but also helps the environment which is one of the goals promoted by Aldi. The 25 cent rental fee for shopping carts is refunded when the customer returns the cart to the cart corral.

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NEW FARMER'S MARKET OPEN SATURDAY MORNINGS

Alabaster residents can now look forward to a variety of fresh products produced right here in Alabama at the new Alabaster Farmer's Market.

The market, which is a joint collaboration between the City of Alabaster and local nonprofit organization Sowers of Seed, will be held once a week each Saturday through August 16.

"We are a state-certified market, and we're partnering with the City to provide this for our residents," said Sowers of Seed founder Lynn Coleman.

The market is held each Saturday behind the new City administrative building at 1953 Municipal Way. The market runs from 8 a.m. till 12 noon.

According to Coleman, all of the farmers will be

local, which means shoppers will be able to find the freshest products.

"We have growers from around the area," said Coleman, who will be managing the market. "I think our furthest farm producer is out of Eclectic, and that is pork. He raises his own pigs and then has those processed."

Shoppers will also be able to get fresh peaches from Clanton, as well as locally-farmed zucchini and squash. There will also be locally-produced honey.

"We'll have someone that produces honey," said Coleman. "That's the best kind of honey for allergy purposes."

Coleman said she recently visited with a local goat farmer who produces goat-milk soaps and lotions.

"It was great," said Coleman. "It's a little fouracre farm on the back side of Ballantrae called Dolce Latte Farm. They'll be coming to our market every other Saturday."

Creating a farmer's market in Alabaster is something Coleman said she'd been hoping to do for awhile.

"It's been a goal of ours since our conception. That was part of the dream of Sowers of Seed to meet a nutritional need in our community by providing the best of the best in produce to our residents," she said.

Coleman credited City Manager George Henry and Alabaster Mayor Marty Handlon for lending their support to the project. She also said the market may grow in the future,



depending on how it goes this year.

"This year, we're only filling ten tents, but we're going to look to expand," said Coleman. "Maybe next year we'll add more. We're just going to see the response of the community and get ideas from the farmers."

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CHUBBS GRUB STATION WINS AWARD

Chubb's Grub Station in Alabaster was recently honored with a Small Business of the Year award by the Greater Shelby County Chamber of Commerce. The Chamber presented the award at a June 25 awards luncheon held at the Pelham Civic Complex and Ice Arena in Pelham.

"This was our second small business awards program," said GSCCC President Kirk Mancer in a July 9 interview. "We started it last year. The purpose of it relates back to the business development and support aspect of our Shelby One fiveyear strategic plan."

At the June 25 luncheon, the Chamber recognized four small businesses in categories based on the size of their businesses.

"We had a total of 35 nominees in the various categories," said Mancer. "There were four recipients, one in each category. Those were based upon the number of employees that a company has."

According to Mancer, the winners were selected by a panel of judges, which included a banker, an attorney and an accountant.

"Once they were nominated, they were then asked to provide some information," said Mancer. "(The judges) reviewed the information that the nominees submitted, and based upon that information, they then made a determination as to who the recipient was in each category."

The awards luncheon, which was sponsored by

Regions Bank, was hosted by the Chamber's Small Business Work Group. The other three Business of the Year honorees included Trash Taxi, Calera Dental Center and Event Operations Group.

"These were businesses that were nominated from all over the county. You did not have to be a current Chamber member to be nominated, so it truly was an open opportunity," said Mancer.

Chubb's Grub Station is located in Alabaster, next to the Hallmark store in the Southbrook Village shopping center. It was opened in October of 2013 by owner Will Cholewinski and has already made a strong impression on local diners. The restaurant offers hearty portions of

nally added in 2011 as a way to help fund the newly formed school district. Now it will be used to repay the bond issue, as well as "other public school purposes." Ordinance No. 14-006,

which can be found online at the City of Alabaster website (Cityofalabaster.com), specifically pledges 1 percent of the municipal general sales and use tax to the School Board "through the last maturity date of the Series 2014 Warrants."

The Council vote was not unanimous, however, and some elected officials expressed concerns about the length of the commitment. Councilman Russell Bedsole voted against the pledge, while Councilwoman Stacy

Rakestraw chose to abstain.

Mayor Marty Handlon issued her own statement, voicing financial concerns with the pledge.

"Research reveals that the school systems in which we might aspire to be compared to receive funding by the sure and steady stream of ad valorem taxes, not the ever fluctuating and volatile sales tax," Handlon wrote.

Despite those concerns, however, the funding pledge passed, giving the School Board's plan for a new high school the backing it needed to move forward. For Alabaster students, that means a new high school should be somewhere not too far off in the future. And as usual, it's a great day to be a Warrior!





Explorers, the Shelby County Sheriff's Office, the FBI, the U.S. Marshals, SafeHouse and K9 Specialty Services of Alabama, among others.

This year's event will be slightly different than in the past, due to the recent addition of Dick's Sporting Goods to the shopping center. Dick's, which held its grand opening in April, was constructed beside Target in what was formerly a parking area.

According to Cory Thomas, one of Target's store managers, this year's event will be in the Target parking lot, to the left of the store's entrance.

"If you're looking at our building, it will be in the parking lot to the left," said Thomas.


The event also features food and drink, as well as

they received at the APSE conference specifically relate to their involvement with helping adults with developmental disabilities find employment.

"We're a nonprofit organization that serves children and adults with developmental disabilities. There are a whole range of disabilities that fall into that category. We have lifespan services. We provide early intervention for children, birth to age three, and employment services for adults," said Stokes.

According to the Alabama APSE website (www.al-apse.org), the Alabama Chapter of APSE is part of a national organization that has over 5,000 members in 31 states. Its mission is to promote employment opportunities

for individuals with disabilities through education and other forms of support.

In addition to the awards presentation, the 2014 conference featured a variety of continuing education opportunities for professionals in the disability arena, e.g., counselors, social workers, etc.

"It's an excellent conference," said Stokes. "We employ six employment specialists who work in that particular program, so it's a really good professional opportunity for them to be there for that conference."

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BIRDWATCHERS FLOCK TO PARK

Recently the
Birmingham Audubon
Society hosted an introductory birding class at
Alabaster's Limestone
Park. The beginner bird
walk, which drew approximately 60 people, gave
novice birdwatchers a
chance to see a variety of
different birds in a wholly
unique spot.

"It went real well," said Kenneth Wills, a member of the Birmingham Audubon's conservation committee. "We hold these periodically throughout the year at different places around Birmingham. I think the last three springs we've done one at Limestone Park during the late winter/early spring, which is a good time to catch migrant birds coming through."

According to Wills, the

group was able to see a variety of birds, including great egrets, great blue herons, red-tailed hawks, coots, Canadian geese, blue-winged teal, sandpipers and meadowlarks. He said the area is special because it offers a unique combination of different habitats in one location.

"It's one of the best birding spots around in Birmingham because you have grasslands and wetlands. That's something you don't have in most places," said Wills. "It's just a great place to take people, and there are easy birds to show people because they're bigger birds like the great egrets and the herons."

The crowd of new birders included adults and children alike.

"Anybody could show

up," said Wills. "If folks didn't have binoculars we had extra sets. We set up spotting scopes, so the kids could look through them."

According to Wills, the group visited several different spots at the park in order to take advantage of the diversity.

"We walked around different parts of the park. We flushed some snipe out of the wetland," he said. "We didn't just stay on the platform."

Limestone Park, which is located off Highway 31 just past Saginaw Pipe, features a birding platform that overlooks a large wetland. Members of the Audubon Society have also installed birdhouses at various points around the park to attract birds.

Those in attendance also got a special treat

when a rehabilitated bird was released back into the wild. The bird had been treated for an injury at the Alabama Wildlife Center at Oak Mountain State Park.

"One of our volunteers named Greg Harber, he brought a male bobwhite quail that had gotten injured," said Wills. "He released that on the site, and the kids all got to watch it."

Wills said the group will be holding a work day in the future for anyone that wants to pitch in. He said they will probably meet at the site at 8 a.m. and work from 9 to 11.



NATURE TREK AT THE BEACH BY DAVID FRINGS



If the Alabama beaches are on your vacation list this summer, you may want to include a nature trek on your itinerary. Gulf Shores and Orange Beach were not always covered with high-rise condos, restaurants, and souvenir shops. If you would like to experience the Alabama



beaches of years past, then the Bon Secour National Wildlife Refuge should be number one on your list. The 7,000 acre refuge, named as one of the 10 natural wonders of Alabama, is located on the road to Fort Morgan. The refuge provides habitat that supports migrating birds, the endangered Alabama beach mouse, and nesting sea turtles. Habitats found on the refuge include beaches, sand dunes, scrub forest,

fresh and saltwater marshes, freshwater swamps, and upland forest. The name "Bon Secour" comes from the French and translates to "Safe Harbor." Bon Secour is certainly a safe harbor for wildlife habitats that are now missing in most areas of the Alabama Gulf coast. The protected habitat supports over 370 species of birds during the spring and fall migrations at the refuge.

I was impressed with the beach and dune habitats at the refuge. They remind me of the Gulf Shores that I visited as a young boy in the late 50's and early 60's. The snowwhite beaches transform to the rolling dune habitat with wind-swept juniper, scrub oaks, and sea oats. Sea oats are an important plant for beach conservation since their deep roots hold the sand in place and reduce erosion by wind and water. This section of beach has very little development which makes for an enjoyable visit whether you want to soak up the rays or look for rays in the crystal clear surf. If you grow tired of the beach, there are shaded hiking trails that twist their way through the scrub forest and other habitats. If you head for the trails, don't forget to pack insect repellent for those biting mosguitos and deer flies. For more information on Bon Secour, visit www.fws.gov/bonsecour/

Other interesting nature opportunities include Weeks Bay Reserve which is located west of Foley on Mobile Bay. Weeks Bay has an interpretive center, walking trails, and a raised walkway overlooking a pitcher bog. The bog supports several species of carnivorous plants, including pitcher plants and sundews. They are also home to delicate species of native orchids. Need I say that wildlife and wildflower photo-ops

abound! The preserve is a hot spot for a high diversity of native wildlife, especially birding and butterfly watching. For more information on Week's Bay visit nerrs.noaa.gov/Reserve.asp x?ResID=WKB.

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
